The Truth About College Admissions:

How to Use This Roadmap

This is a skeleton, not a script.

Every student's path is different, and the goal of this roadmap is not to prescribe every step. Instead, it gives you a strategic overview of what matters when, and how to make decisions that align with your student's evolving story.

At each grade level, we'll include:

- Key strategic moves
- Suggested action items
- Reflection prompts to spark self-knowledge

If you're feeling behind, don't panic. Start where you are. What matters is that you begin.



9th Grade: Build the Foundation

Strategic Focus:

Develop habits, explore interests, and lay the groundwork for your student's narrative.

Key Moves:

- Build strong academic habits. GPA starts now. Every grade matters, especially at schools that put numeric grades on transcripts (1-100) instead of letters (A/B/C).
- Join 2–3 activities that seem interesting. Follow your genuine curiosity.
- Begin building relationships with teachers. Which teachers do you gravitate towards naturally given you're passionate about their subject?
- Explore without pressure over the summer: volunteer, take a course (pay-to-play summer programs at this phase are fine), or start a personal project based on a need in your local community.

Reflection Prompts:

- What makes you lose track of time?
- Who do you admire, and why?
- What's one moment this year that made you feel proud?
- Which teachers/subjects do you find yourself naturally gravitating towards?

Message to Families:

Your student doesn't need to know what they want to study. But they do need space to explore *intentionally*. That process is more powerful when guided and prompted with the right questions.

10th Grade: Experiment and Refine

Strategic Focus:

Begin narrowing interests, increasing your academic rigor in courses, and clarifying direction.

Key Moves:

- Take on more academic rigor (honors/AP), particularly in courses related to your future major/academic concentrations.
- Stick with the 2-4 activities that feel most authentic. Begin showing up with consistency to meetings and scope out opportunities for future leadership.
- Take the PSAT, if offered.
- Start exploring career paths and college majors informally.
- Use the summer for deeper involvement or exploration (part-time jobs, more selective summer programs, projects).



Reflection Prompts:

- What makes you lose track of time?
- Who do you admire, and why?
- What's one moment this year that made you feel proud?
- Which teachers/subjects do you find yourself naturally gravitating towards?

Message to Families:

Your student doesn't need to know what they want to study. But they do need space to explore *intentionally*. That process is more powerful when guided and prompted with the right questions.

11th Grade: Strategize and Accelerate

Strategic Focus:

Convert self-knowledge into a compelling application strategy.

Key Moves:

- Prioritize academic performance—this is the most important transcript year. Aim high and lean into rigorous courses (AP, IB, dual enrollment, self-studying for AP or taking AP/DC courses online). Some even require all AP scores/predicted IB scores to be shared so keep that in mind as you're preparing for your exams.
- Finalize a balanced college list (reaches, targets, likelies).
- Visit campuses or attend virtual information sessions to gauge fit. This is particularly important if you're targeting colleges that track demonstrated interest.
- Begin test prep (SAT/ACT). Note that most Ivy+ universities do require test scores again.
- Start drafting your personal essay (we recommend the summer before senior year).
- Deepen impact and leadership in chosen extracurriculars.

Reflection Prompts:

- What patterns do you see in your interests?
- What personal qualities have you developed most in high school?
- If you could teach a class about anything, what would it be and why?

Message to Families:

Junior year is where narratives are built. Don't chase perfection—chase alignment. Every decision should support the story your student wants to tell about their growth and development.



Checkpoint Audit: *Is Your Student on Track?*

It's easy to lose the forest for the trees. Here's a simple grade-level audit to help you assess where your student stands — and where to lean in next.

If your student is in 9th grade and...

- Isn't consistently turning in work or asking for help
- Hasn't found any activities they enjoy
- Has no awareness of how high school ties to college

It's time to build structure and work on executive functioning skills.

If your student is in 10th grade and...

- Still doesn't know what interests them or what they're good at
- Has no testing plan, college awareness, or extracurricular consistency
- Feels disengaged or "just going through the motions"

It's time to get focused and guided.

If your student is in 11th grade and...

- Hasn't visited schools, built a college list, or started essays
- Isn't confident about testing or their academic direction
- Hasn't thought about recommendation letters or financial fit

It's time to move — fast, but strategically.
